Luncheon in November. As we begin this 15th anniversary year, we want this milestone to be about more than just celebrations. We

want it to be meaningful for the long run —to use this opportunity to think ahead and to strengthen our organization so that we can better accomplish our mission in the years to come. With this in mind, we've set in motion several

"governance-related" initiatives.

The first, the Scholar Support Task Force under the leadership of Pat Leake, is tasked with developing a strategic plan related to scholarship support. In addition, this Task Force is examining our "funding cycle" issue which relates to the fact that our current process is to raise money in the spring and award it in the fall. This compressed sched-

ule gives us very little time to plan or to give adequate notice to the Universities. From a sound business perspective we should be raising the money in one year and giving it away the next, but we need to figure out the best way to make that transition.

A related effort under the leadership of University Relations VP Kathy Berry and incoming VP Deede Stephenson has been to strengthen our relationships with the universities at the senior academic Provost level, in addition to the school and departmental relationships that already exist. We've had our first very successful meeting with the Associate Provost for Graduate Studies, Dr. Lisa Tedesco, at Emory University and we're in the process of scheduling a similar meeting at Georgia Tech.

The second special initiative is being undertaken by the Governance and Organization Task Force led by Anne Boyd. They are taking a look at our governing structure—our bylaws, our standing rules and our policies and procedures. For a completely volunteer organization such as ours, these governing rules and procedures are crucial to our continuity and ability to govern ourselves successfully.

A third effort involves credit cards, and Betty Feezor is working with Treasurer Pam Jenkins and others to explore the use of credit cards as an option for payment, consistent with the practice of most of our fellow ARCS chapters.

A fourth relates to our archives – all the paper we accumulate as an organization. Clare Whitfield has begun an effort to address this which will now be continued by Reg Bridges, our new historian.

As my first year as President draws to a close, I am so proud to be part of this organization and continue to be very impressed with what we do to help enhance the scientific competitiveness of the US versus the rest of the world. Best wishes for a wonderful summer and we look forward to a busy, fun and productive fall season for ARCS.

This year's ARCS General Meeting, celebrating the 15th Anniversary of our chapter, had a very special program. Two of our first scholars, David J. Austin and Deborah Kilpatrick flew in from New York and California respectively, to share their "Reflections on Scholarship, Philanthropy and ARCS Support."

It goes without saying that both had impressive resumes. David Austin is currently Scientific Advisor at Darby & Darby P.C., a New York law firm specializing in intellectual property. After receiving his Ph.D. in Chemistry at Emory, he received an appointment as a postdoc at Harvard and then an assistant professorship at Yale. During this process he founded one company and served as a scientific advisor to another. His decision to move into industry was based on the realization that he could have a greater effect on advancing scientific discoveries by doing this than by staying in the laboratory. He plans to go to law school so that he will be more effective at shepherding new ideas from the lab to the marketplace. Deborah Kilpatrick decided that her career path would be in industry while she was still at Georgia Tech studying the mechanical properties of diseased arteries. As a non-medical researcher in the field of atherosclerosis. she realized that she could have the largest impact on patients by working on new treatment technologies. She

spent several years at

Guidant and through her persistence was responsible for a major new study, still underway (now at Abbott Laboratories), concerned with risk stratification in women who have had a heart attack or stroke. Once completed, it will enable doctors to deliver treatment to the patients who will benefit the most from them. Deborah is currently Vice President of Market Development for CardioDx, Inc., a molecular diagnostics company specializing in heart disease.

An experienced presenter, David was so moved by the opportunity to address us that he had to take a moment to compose himself before he could begin. He said that the personal validation he felt from the ARCS members instilled a sense of self-confidence that was essential to his success. Anne Boyd mentioned as she introduced David that he listed the ARCS award on his resume. We are very pleased that with all of his important accomplishments David feels that this award still merits this honor. Deborah said that having the Atlanta ARCS Chapter

Award made it feel as though her mother was with her in graduate school. The personal connection to our members was as important to her as the financial support. (Some will remember that Deborah gave us a personal tour of her Georgia Tech lab, worked with us on the Sparks program and spoke to us when we visited San Francisco in 2000.) Deborah did say that the money was also important as it enabled her to reduce her teaching load allowing more time for her research.

As we were waiting to retrieve our cars, Elizabeth Spiegel couldn't resist showing me a photo of her darling grandchildren. I realized that we need an ARCS equivalent of a grandma's brag book. We are equally proud of our adopted scholar offspring, especially David and Deborah. We are very grateful that we are important to them as well.

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ARCS Members Tour Coverdell Center

The Paul D. Coverdell Center for Biomedical and Health Sciences on the campus of the University of Georgia was the scene of the ARCS Spring tour. Nearly 30 members and guests toured this year-old facility which is designed to maximize interactions between the life sciences. The Center was built as a memorial to the late U.S. Senator Coverdell who was committed to education and biomedical research.

Following a welcome and brief history of the Center by Dr. Harry Dailey, Director of the Biomedical and Health Sciences Institute (BHSI), the group divided into small tour groups. Included in the tours were the Biolmaging Research Center (BIRC), the Center for Health and Risk Communication (CHRC), the Center for Tropical and Emerging Global Diseases (CTEGD), Flow Cytometry Laboratory, and the Coverdell Center Zebrafish Facility. Presentations were made by faculty members from the Complex Carbohydrate Research Center

(CCRC), Institute for Behavioral Research (IBR), and the UGA Veterinary School. Briefly summarizing, BIRC is investigating into the workings of the brain, CHRC focuses on improving health communications of the poor, CTEGD supports research related to tropical and emerging diseases, and the Zebrafish Facility is researching how genes affect cells.

We were impressed with the state-of-theart equipment, the level of research and the commitment to education at the Coverdell Center. The Center is dedicated to understanding, diagnosing, preventing and treating disease. ARCS is proud to provide scholarships to many of the young men and women studying in this facility.

We ended the afternoon with a social hour where we were greeted by Coverdell Center staff and the nine University of Georgia ARCS scholars. Our thanks to Jane Dolinger and Cathey Millichap for organizing this tour.
