Sherry Lundeen President ARCS Atlanta Speaking at the Annual Spring Meeting May 13, 2009

As this first year draws to a close, I would like to say that it has been a privilege and honor to serve as President of the ARCS Atlanta Chapter. Our chapter has had an outstanding year due to the hard work of our Board and committees, the generosity of members, corporations, foundations and friends who believe in ARCS and the ARCS mission. This year ARCS Atlanta has awarded a cumulative total of over \$2.1 million to 427 scholars pursuing degrees in math, science and engineering to enhance scientific and technological innovations.

We kicked off the year with the Winship Cancer Institute field trip. In November we welcomed Dr. Donald Stein, to the Scholars Luncheon, a wise-cracking researcher who was quick to tell us the last thing he thought he would be doing was working with rats—but plans do change along the education track! We awarded \$197,000 to 34 graduate and undergraduate scholars from our 4 institutions Emory University, Georgia Institute of Technology, University of Georgia and Morehouse College.

Speaking of Morehouse, in January Dr. Robert Franklin shared the history & mission of Morehouse College and the making of the "Renaissance Man" and we honored Jeanne Berry our 2009 ARCS Light. In February we toured the Structures Lab at the Georgia Institute of Technology our newest department to receive a scholar award, and in April we gathered at the Wieland's home for a spectacular night of friendship and art!

What am I forgetting—oh yes—committee meetings, board meetings, fundraising meetings, national ARCS Board trips, emails, emails, emails!!, family, parents and as you all know Granddaddy!! And John wonders what I do all day!

### **Global Water Issues Take Center Stage at May Luncheon**

In some areas, more than 50% of adolescent girls drop out if they attend schools without sanitation facilities. Their lack of education coupled with the time spent collecting water severely impacts each woman's ability to earn an income, perpetuating the cycle of poverty.

Over 75 members and guests attended the **ARCS Spring Luncheon and Annual Meeting** which was held on May 13<sup>th</sup> at 103 West. President Sherry Lundeen welcomed everyone and began the extensive business meeting. Committee chairs presented their reports. Anne Boyd, 2008 ARCS Light, introduced Jeanne Berry, the 2009 ARCS Light. leanne's daughter was present as her mother was honored. Other special guests were introduced and included the newest honorary member, Val Peterson, wife of G.P. "Bud" Peterson, the new president at Georgia Tech. Sherry summarized her first year as president, and those remarks are included on the adjoining page.

Following lunch, ARCS member, Kathryn Graves, introduced the guest speaker, Dr. Christine Moe, the Director of the Center for Global Safe Water at the Rollins School of Public Health and the Eugene J. Gangarosa Professor of Safe Water and Sanitation.

Dr. Moe's research has focused primarily on the environmental transmission of infectious agents particularly food borne and waterborne disease. Her presentation was, "Making Every Drop Count." Dr. Moe emphasized that the statistics surrounding the lack of safe water and sanitation are dire. The facts were an eye-opener for all of us.

We learned that daily an estimated 5,000 children die from diseases caused by a lack of safe drinking water and poor sanitation. In poor rural areas, women and children are responsible for collecting water for their households and walk an average of 3.7 miles carrying five gallons of water each day. Even then, there is no guarantee that the water is safe to drink.

Lack of safe water and sanitation are particularly detrimental for women. In some areas, more than 50% of adolescent girls drop out if they attend schools without sanitation facilities. Their lack of education coupled with the time spent collecting water severely impacts each woman's ability to earn an income, perpetuating the cycle of poverty. If women have empowerment through education and income, the first priority for them and their families is to have safe water and sanitation.

To address these issues, The Center for Global Safe Water (CGSW) partners with colleagues from Emory University and experts at Care USA, Georgia Tech, The Carter Center, CDC, and private organizations to improve access to safe water and sanitation worldwide. Dr. Moe summarized her presentation by emphasizing that the way to meet this goal is through training dedicated students, conducting applied research projects and evaluating them, and continuing the collaboration with their partners to gain political commitment and financial resources.

A big thanks goes to Special Events Cochairs, Sally Boice and Susan Higley for organizing the event. Also, we thank Ginny Plummer and Kitty Hawks for the beautiful floral centerpieces.

# **ARCS Foundation Wins Highest Honors for Extraordinary Service to Education**

The ARCS Foundation, nationally recognized for its scholarship programs promoting science and engineering education, has been singled out by the Council for Advancement and Support of Education (CASE) for its highest award - the James L. Fisher Award for Distinguished Service to Education.

In making the award, CASE cited the ARCS Foundation for its granting of more than 13,000 scholarships valued at \$66 million to some 7,700 students over 50 years. Founded after the launch of the Russian Sputnik in 1957, the allvolunteer women's organization is dedicated to promoting United States leadership in various scientific fields.

With 1,500 members in 14 chapters in 11 states, the ARCS Foundation supports students in 48 colleges and universities across the country.

In announcing the award, John Lippincott, CASE President said, "The Distinguished Service Awards recognize efforts that have made a significant difference in the ability of educational institutions to fulfill their missions and achieve their visions."

CASE serves more than 3,400 universities, colleges

and independent primary and secondary schools in 61 countries with resources for professional development, information and standards in the fields of educational fundraising, communications, marketing and alumni relations and gives its Distinguished Service Award to recognize significant achievement in educational missions and vision.

The award will be presented at the CASE 2009 Summit for Advanced Leaders in San Francisco in July.
